Lee D. While other states like Texas are still recovering from recent winter storms and freezing temperatures which caused about \$195 billion in property damage, Connecticut residents don't need to worry about extended statewide blackouts and a similar type of energy crisis.

"Our state has been pushing energy efficiency measures for some time. As a result, we have more efficient HVAC systems, cheaper lighting projects, and a compact fluorescent bulb costs about a quarter of the price in Connecticut compared to some other states," Lee explains.
